Treat rude and cruel people with the same love and kindness as you treat others, it increases your creativity

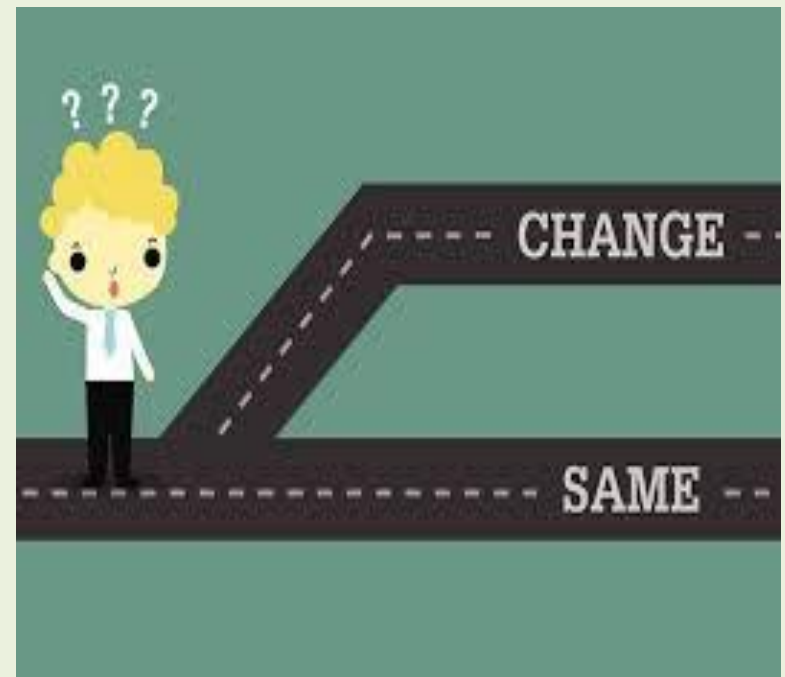
When you feel you are unchallenged or not utilizing your skills, walk up to your supervisor, but be ready for the task that awaits

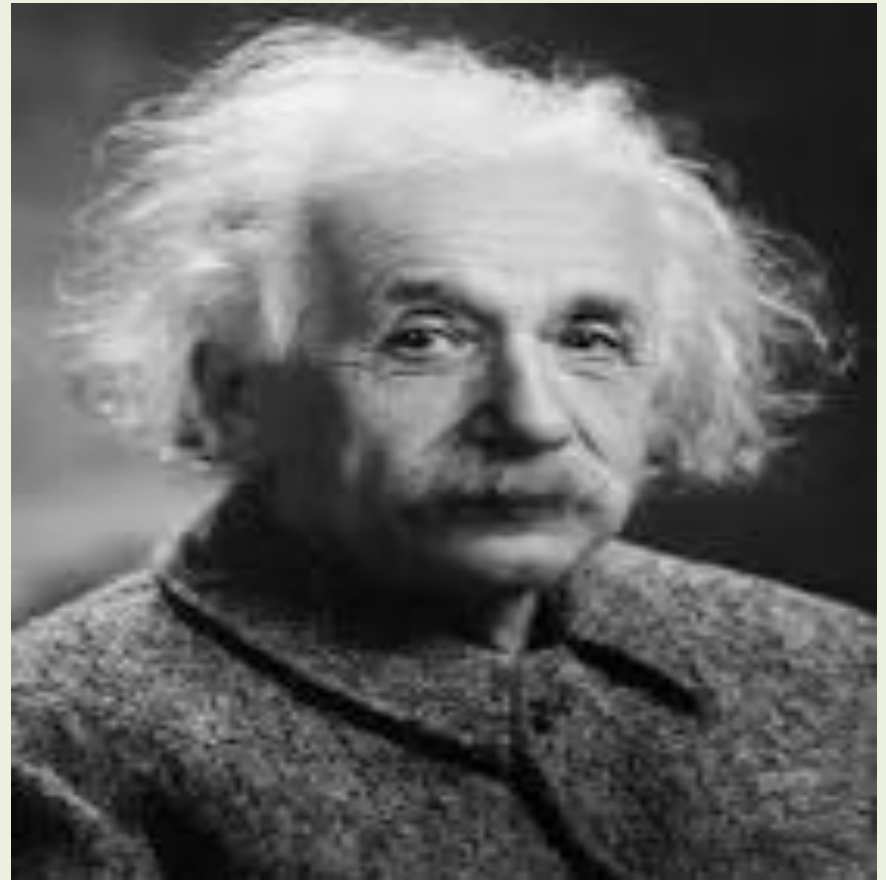
